UN Peacekeeping Update: 16 Missions on 4 Continents

There are 15 UN peacekeeping operations and one special political mission (UNAMA) currently deployed on four continents. These missions are led by the UN Department of Peacekeeping Operations (DPKO). The current list is as follows:

UN Mission Personnel Achieve Academic Success

We at the Peace Operations Training Institute (POTI) applaud all our students for their interest in increasing their proficiency and professionalism. We also acknowledge and applaud the great effort by the Mission Training Focal Points to publicize the POTI curriculum, thereby building the capacity of mission personnel to perform their tasks with greater knowledge and understanding. Each United Nations Peacekeeping mission is represented amongst the student body at POTI, — congratulations on your hard work and academic achievements.

Within United Nations Peacekeeping missions, POTI offers several different programmes that assist mission personnel to study. Two programmes are funded from mission budgets and two others are funded by sponsor nations. All enrolees who are eligible to apply under these programmes study at no personal cost. Mission personnel who are not funded for free programmes may study at greatly reduced tuition.

The Integrated Distance Learning Programme (IDLP) is funded from Mission budgets. The Mission purchases a licence that covers a specific category of the staff (e.g. all national staff) who can then study courses free of charge. In the past year, MINURSO and MINURCAT participated in IDLP. Option I is a variation of IDLP that is also funded from Mission budgets. In this case the Mission purchases a package of course enrolments that can be used by all categories of personnel with approval by the Mission Training Officer/Integrated Mission Training Centre. In 2010—2011, MINUSTAH employed a comprehensive approach that covered all mission personnel and consequently was the major user with 3,538 course enrolments. Other Missions participating in Option I were: UNAMA, UNAMI, UNAMID, UNMIS, and UNOCI. There were over 15,000 IDLP and Option I enrolments during the last licence year. We look forward to continued support for these programmes in 2011—2012.

In addition to the two Programmes funded by Mission budgets, uniformed peacekeepers, may avail themselves of free courses through sponsored regional programmes. Australia, Canada, Organisation internationale de la Francophonie (OIF), Hungary, The Netherlands, Norway, Sweden, and the United Kingdom sponsor E-Learning for African Peacekeepers (ELAP) and E-Learning for Latin American and Caribbean Peacekeepers (ELPLAC). These programmes are designed to offer capacity-building opportunities to all military personnel, police and gendarmerie from Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean.

Other personnel serving in UN Missions, including contractors and temporary workers who are not covered by any of the funded Programmes, may undertake their studies at specially discounted prices. During 2010 close to 1,200 courses were enrolled in by self-paying mission personnel.

Regardless of your study programme, be it IDLP, Option I, ELAP, ELPLAC or Mission Discount, you are to be congratulated on your achievements. We encourage you to finish up that course you began a while ago and suggest you enrol in a new course soon. Well done.

POTI Receives Excellent Feedback from ELAP Research

POTI conducted a comprehensive six month research project on the ELAP (E-Learning for African Peacekeepers) programme by running focus groups, conducting interviews, and administering surveys. The individuals queried were current peacekeepers, supervisors of peacekeepers, people involved in the delivery of peacekeeping training at national peacekeeping training centres, and Training Focal Points/Chief Civilian Personal Officers (TFPs/ CCPOs) at United Nations peacekeeping missions. The key findings from this research on ELAP are as follows:

- 70.8% of ELAP students are currently serving on a peacekeeping mission, 12% have previously served on a mission and 27.7% hope to serve on a mission in the future;
- For thousands of African peacekeepers ELAP provides the principal training on peacekeeping that is received before being deployed on a PSO. 44.6% of the ELAP

graduates^{*} indicated that they had never attended a classroom training course at a national peacekeeping training

 97% of ELAP students, 89% of the peacekeeping training providers at the national peacekeeping training centres and 73.9% of the TFPs/ CCPOs Say that POTI's courses offer peacekeepers practical knowledge to better perform their jobs.
